

EXHIBITOR(S) SUGGESTIONS:

The Middleville Agricultural Society would like to receive comments and/or suggestions from the public and exhibitors. There will be a suggestion box in the office for written comments/suggestions. All submissions will be reviewed by the Board.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. All exhibitors of livestock, excluding poultry, must provide proof of liability insurance. Insurance company & policy Number are required on the entry form.
- NEW THIS YEAR! MAS membership payable at time of entry. The sum of five dollars, paid to the Secretary or Treasurer as a membership fee, will constitute the person paying the same, a member of the Society for the current year. Competition for any of the prizes offered is open only to members of the Middleville Agricultural Society.
- 3. Owners of the purebred animals exhibited will be required to furnish the Secretary with a copy of the registered pedigree of such animal, or a declaration made before the Justice of the Peace or other Officer authorized to make Affidavits, that such animal is purebred and which shall state the name and number of both sire and dam before receiving tickets for same. This rule to be strictly enforced.
- 4. All livestock, including poultry, must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor, except purebred stock, for which transfer certificates must be produced before prize money is paid. All other exhibits are to be owned for a period of three months.
- No person will be allowed to enter for competition more than one specimen in any section of a class (this rule does not apply to animals or heritage, but to all other classes).
- 6. All livestock or other articles to be competed for to be the bonafide property of the exhibitor, and any exhibitor who shall attempt to defraud the Society in this or any other particulars, shall forfeit all other prizes accruing to him or her. All bags and other articles are to be without any mark.
- 7. All grain and produce must be grown by the Exhibitor in the current year of the fair.
- 8. All exhibitors of cattle and sheep will be required to bring these animals into the ring to be judged.
- 9. All animals must be securely fastened.
- All articles in the Exhibit Hall Classes and Senior Citizens' Classes must be manufactured by the exhibitor.
- 11. Judges shall withhold a prize if they consider the article undeserving of one.
- 12. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with any of the Judges while in discharge of their duties, or who shall afterwards on the premises of the Society, use any contemptuous or abusive language to any Judge, shall forfeit his/ her right to any premiums to which he/ she might be otherwise entitled and Judges are requested to report any such interference.
- 13. All poultry and livestock must be placed on the grounds by 10:00 a.m. Judging of Light Horses begins at 10:00 a.m. Other livestock begins at 11:00 a.m. All goods for exhibition in the hall must be in on the evening preceding the Fair and the hall will be open from 5:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. for this purpose. No article is to be lifted or sold before 4:00 p.m. Fair day. Any article remaining after 5:00 p.m. will be placed in the fair office at the owner's risk.

- 14. In order to cover Society expenses, hall exhibits will have a deduction of 15% of prize money retained. The Society reserves the right to refuse any entry.
- 15. No person shall be allowed to sell or dispose of any fruits, foods, wares or merchandise on the Society's grounds, or within three hundred yards thereof without having obtained the consent of the Officers of the Society, nor shall any gambling or game of chance be allowed on the Society's grounds or within a half mile thereof.
- 16. While the Directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to assure the safety of the exhibits sent to the Fair, it is to be understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting and should any article be accidentally damaged, lost. or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power towards the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment for the value thereof.
- 17. If the receipts of the year are insufficient to meet the prize list in full, the prizes will be paid pro rata as the funds permit.
- 18. The Middleville Agricultural Society will not be held responsible for any accidents occurring to its patrons on the fair grounds during the Fair or at any other time.
- 19. All cheques for prize money must be cashed before December 30 of the current year. Otherwise, the money will be retained by the Society.
- Should any dispute or question arise not provided for in the Rules and Regulations, the decision of the Board of Directors shall be final.
- 21. CHECK EXPIRY DATE ON ALL GIFT CERTIFICATES WON. GIFT CERTIFI CATES CANNOT BE REDEEMED FOR CASH.

- Novice is someone who is uncomfortable at the canter and has not shown elsewhere in canter classes - applies to riding classes only
- Horses may only show in 2 divisions not counting lead line
- English or Western attire for all classes
- Junior and Senior may be split if there are enough entries
- "Open" means all ages.
- Child: 11 years and under
- Junior: 12 to 16 years
- Senior 17 and over.

Rider ability to count for equitation classes. Riders in lead line classes are not eligible for classes requiring a jog/trot. Riders in walk-trot/jog classes are not eligible to ride in canter/lope classes. Costume classes judged on costume only with all ages and leaders welcome.





- C. The winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
- D. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
- E. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- F. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competition.

Local Fair Competition

- Local fair is entitled to send only the Grand Champion Quilt, (min. 324" measured on the perimeter) judged the best of show of all hand quilted quilts to the District Competition. OR
 - If any entry wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of ALL ELIGIBLE QUILTS at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST OF SHOW OF ALL CLASSES quilt in the District Competition.
- **NOTE:** If an Exhibitor wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts at other than his/her own fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.
- 2. An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.
- Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of all ELIGIBLE quilts. As well as RESERVE Grand Champion or SECOND Best of Show of all ELIGLIBLE quilts.

The GRAND CHAMPION and the RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE quilts.

District Competition

- Judging quilts at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each OAAS District
- The first place winning hand quilted quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Championship Quilt Competition at their Annual Convention.

 If any entry wins Grand Champion or Best of Show of all eligible Machine-

If any entry wins *Grand Champion* or *Best of Show* of all eligible *Machine-Quilted Quilts* at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this item was entered and won, should enter their *Reserve Champion* or *Second Best of Show* of eligible Machine-Quilted Quilt in the District Competition.

Glossary of Terms: Digital imaging is the art of making digital photographs, or artwork - through the use of a digital camera or image capture device, or by scanning a print and saving as an image file. This is encouraged and a great idea, as it helps promote your fair. Just remember, submit only one entry per category to the OAAS competition on behalf of your Society. Ask your photographers to send their images to your Society. One CD must be prepared by your Society and sent to the OAAS by the deadline. Submitting images from your fair's photo contest? If it's a print, scan it to a JPEG file. If it's a digital image, simple burn it to a CD with the rest of your society's photo entries.

Guidelines: All images are to be taken at your 2017 Fair.

- 18. Fair Ambassador Involvement--e.g.—with displays/ribbons etc.
- 19. What is this year's fair theme?--e.g.--displays/signs etc.
- 20. Advertising Your Fair e.g. photo showing a fair sign constructed of Agricultural Products including the Fair and the date. For example: a store window/store front/lawn display/field display etc.
- 21. Something "new" this year at your fair.

- Quality of image: focus/angle of shot/lighting
- Content of image: category/appeal to viewer/Fair involvement
- Educational Value: informative/ Promotional?
- Fair identification---e.g.--ribbons/signs etc.
